

2024 All Together Symposium Backgrounder

About the Symposium:

The 2024 All Together Symposium (ATS) is part of the BC Centre for Palliative Care's (BCCPC) efforts to galvanize collaborative work aimed at fostering compassionate communities, advance palliative care practices, and nurture partnership initiatives between the health system and community approaches to palliative care. This is the second provincial event to bring together palliative care partners from across BC, including palliative care leaders and educators, and attracting delegates from across Canada. This one-day, in-person event enlightens and educates all participants through informative discourse, networking and educational sessions. These presentations and conversations showcase innovative community, research and healthcare programs and approaches.

Why this Symposium is Important:

This year's theme, *Nurturing Partnerships*. *Reimagining Palliative Care*, builds on the successes of our inaugural 2022 symposium. The event includes inspiring presentations, innovative ideas and engaging activities, featuring internationally renowned keynote speakers in the field, Dr. Kelli Stajduhar and Dr. Hsien Seow. 2024 ATS showcases compassionate communities in action, with grassroots initiatives from across British Columbia demonstrating ways to complement and link to the care provided by the formal healthcare system. The symposium is a continuation of BCCPC's work to help bridge the gap between the health system's approach and the compassionate communities' approach to palliative care to highlight successful system-community partnership initiatives. This event is dedicated to focusing on re-envisioning palliative care within Indigenous and underserved communities.

Keynote Speakers Biographies:

Dr. Kelli Stajduhar, RN, PhD, FRSC, FCAHS, FCAN Professor & Canada Research Chair (Tier 1) in Palliative Approaches to Care in Aging and Community Health School of Nursing and Institute and Aging and Lifelong Health University of Victoria. Her clinical work and research have focused on health service needs for those at the end of life and their families, and on the needs of people who experience structural inequities at the end of life.
